Jesus begins at the Mount of Olives, a traditional location for the Jewish Messiah (Zechariah 14:4). Jesus' entry is "triumphal," but not in a military sense as was assumed about the Messiah. Military leaders rode horses while donkeys were used by messengers of peace.
